## Writing Tip

Karen Allen, a former work buddy and editor extraordinaire, asked me to feature a writing tip aimed at correcting the grammatical error of placing "me" first in a sentence. "Makes me nuts," she said.

"Me" is an object pronoun, while "I" is a subject pronoun. This means "me" can never be used as the subject of a sentence. To make it easy, delete "and my friends" before forming a




sentence. You wouldn't say, "Me joined a book club." You'd say, "I joined a book club." For the sake of etiquette, you'd place your friends before yourself in the sentence, which should read, "My friends and I joined a book club."

## The Defiance

Laura Gallier is one amazing Christian storyteller. I stumbled upon her first book in *The Delusion* series as I surfed Amazon for comparable books to my own for publisher pitches. I'd never before read a YA speculative novel that so clearly spelled out spiritual warfare. She follows the life of Owen Edmonds during his senior year of high school and after graduation as he uses his gift of being able to literally see people's shackles, such as addiction, depression, and rage, to help them fight the



demons holding them captive. While this third book in the series is the darkest, it leaves readers with hope and a few handy lessons to combat Satan's lies. I recommend it to older teens.


### **Create a Coloring Book**
